CSL is committed to working with community organizations, governments and other partners to ensure children are as safe as necessary **at home, on the road and at play.**

The team does this through capacity building and partnerships; communication and public relations; advocacy and healthy public policy; and research and evaluation.

We also continue to welcome Newfoundland & Labrador by providing educational resources and answering inquiries from both caregivers and those who work with families.

Manager Remarks

As Manager of Child Safety Link (CSL), I am pleased to provide a snapshot of highlights from another productive year. As always, CSL is committed to keeping children as safe as necessary at home, on the road and at play. Our team expanded this year and continued to work together to accomplish a variety of goals. Due to the pandemic, we worked differently, shifting to working from home to keep our staff safe. Many of our plans did change, but we adjusted our initiatives and successfully completed our plans in different ways.

The report outlines our initiatives by priority areas: Safety at Home; Safety on the Road and Safety at Play. You will also see initiatives highlighted by our pillars of work: Capacity Building & Partnerships; Communications & Public Relations, Advocacy & Healthy Public Policy; and Research & Evaluation. I would like to highlight one of our projects called the "Engagement Project". CSL staff reached out to service providers across Nova Scotia by conducting a series of virtual group discussions. CSL heard about the many challenges of addressing injury prevention and supporting local families. We received valuable feedback that will inform our future initiatives.

We also celebrated several awareness weeks including Child Passenger Safety Week and Poisoning Prevention Week and continued to engage with families and those who support them on our social media channels. These are just a few examples of how CSL has worked to prevent serious injuries while highlighting the importance of injury prevention throughout Atlantic Canada.

Although the pandemic has changed how we work, my staff have demonstrated resilience and continued to be flexible to ensure a successful year. I want to thank them for their on-going dedication and look forward to another year as we continue to strengthen our commitment to children's safety.

Poisoning Prevention

Poison Prevention week: *Poison Prevention: It's In Your Hands*

CSL partnered with the IWK Regional Poison Centre (PC) to celebrate and promote Poison Prevention Week (March 21-27, 2021). CSL/PC focused on raising awareness among parents and caregivers of the measures they can do at home to help prevent unintentional poisonings among children. Activities included a pre-post social media survey, daily social media posts, a blog, traditional media and the development of several new handouts for families.

Facebook Poll: A poll was designed to entice followers to engage with our content during the week and to measure any change in behaviors following the awareness week. CSL provided incentives to those who participated including safety locks (thanks to Parachute Canada). The first poll went out before PPW with 589 followers reached, 9 shares and 212 poll participants. The second poll had 73 poll participants.

The issue: Hand sanitizers in packaging that resembled applesauce/juice

Advocacy:

In August 2020, CSL was alerted by a parent regarding the sale of hand sanitizers in packaging that resembled applesauce/juice packets. CSL verified the claim and created a Trend Alert for social media with support from the IWK Regional Poison Centre. Information was also in traditional media outlets and CSL and Poison Centre staff were interviewed on many occasions. CSL also followed up with retailer and requested the product be removed from shelves. CSL contacted Health Canada to ask for the product to be recalled.

Retailer removed product from shelves. | Health Canada issued a national safety alert.


Fall Prevention Month (Nov 2020)


To celebrate, Child Safety Link partnered with the Atlantic Collaborative on Injury Prevention (ACIP) and developed and released a document entitled: *Social Policies in Atlantic Canada: Links to Children's Fall Prevention* and conducted a national webinar on LOOP/LOOP Junior on the topic.

As a follow-up to this resource, CSL and ACIP also created *Being an Influencer of Social Policy – an injury prevention perspective* and *Infographic: Social policy and Injury Prevention (E/F)* and conducted a national LOOP Webinar in February which drew 41 attendees from across Canada.













Capacity Building & Partnerships

Transporting Children with Special Health Care Needs (CSHCN)



Katherine Hutka (CSL staff) became an instructor during the 2019 Safe Travel for All Children(STAC) training at the IWK. Since then, she has worked to increase the awareness and capacity of those who support children with special healthcare needs to support safe transportation solutions.

Definition: CSHCN includes children with physical, intellectual, developmental, behavioural or emotional differences.

A full definition is available in CSL's Backgrounder on the topic: *Transporting Children with Special Healthcare Needs.*

Community of Practice STAC Canada: To bring together those interested in this issue, CSL has established national network and hosts regular meetings to continue the conversation about the safe transportation of children in Canada.

Although these meetings were temporarily stopped because of the Pandemic, they started back up in January 2021. There have been two meetings with Occupational Therapists, Physiotherapists and nurses from the IWK and Nova Scotia Health and from across Canada. The first meetings of 2021 have included guest speakers Carrie Rhodes (Nationwide Children's Hospital, Ohio) and Anthony McGovern (Automotive Safety Program, Indiana).





IWK Consults, Workshops and Webinars

CSL staff Katherine Hutka is a certified Instructor for STAC. She is often consulted on patient cases at the IWK. This year she participated in 18 consults with children primarily from Occupational Therapy, Orthopedics, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, and the Medical, Surgical and Neurosciences Unit.

Nova Scotia Health – new hospital-based car seat education policy

Over the past few years, K. Hutka promoted and share the IWK Infant Car Seat Policy with others in Nova Scotia. This has resulted in the adaptation and adoption of an Infant Car Seat Education policy for all Nova Scotia Health (NSH) centres. The NSH Infant Car Seat Education Policy went into effect Sept 10, 2020.

This policy is specific to infants discharged from hospital for the first time. CSL supported the development, providing feedback and resources. CSL has also provided 7 training sessions for 241 NSH staff as well as 400 nurse cards (CPS summary) to supplement this training.

Communications and Public Relations

Child Passenger Safety Week: The Right Seat (Sept 20-26, 2020)



This year's theme was *The Right Seat* and focused on how to know if a child is in the right seat for their age and stage. CSL celebrated by creating a new educational resource (E/F), updating the website, increasing social media content and activity, sending out multiple newsletters to advocates and service providers across Atlantic Canada, and conducting media interviews. Some highlights included:

- Poster (E/F): road map demonstrating the various stages of seating a child will
 move through from infancy through to the adult seat belt: Is your child in the
 right seat? (poster); Feuille de route: Votre siège d'auto convient-il à votre
 enfant (affiche)
- Traditional Media & Social Media: included 3 media appearances as well a variety of posts (E/F) each day for the week on Facebook and Twitter (15 English/9 French posts).

Child Passenger Safety Photo shoot

CSL values diversity and wants to ensure our photos represent the families who live in our communities. A photoshoot was held to capture different stages of car seats and families from a variety of cultures and backgrounds. Photos will be used for videos and other projects.

Child Passenger Safety Association of Canada (CPSAC):

K. Hutka continues to serve as the President of CPSAC. She has presented across Canada about CSL's work to support the safe transportation of children with special healthcare needs as well as supporting a nation-wide speaker series for technicians and instructors.

Advocacy & Healthy Public Policy

In the fall of 2020, CSL provided a comprehensive submission to the NS Government regarding recommendations for revisions to Nova Scotia's Traffic Safety Act. Recommendations were specific to child passenger safety.

In February 2021, CSL responded to the Federal Government's call out re *Let's Talk Budget* to promote the need for an increased focus on road safety.



Understanding how to support service providers

Research:

CSL embarked on a local research project to understand the barriers service providers face when supporting vulnerable families to prevent unintentional injuries. CSL focused on this audience because we know that families living in more vulnerable situations (e.g., poverty, low literacy) tend to experience higher rates of unintentional injury.

The engagement sessions highlighted that more can be done to support children's injury prevention including a more unified approach to CSL's work across three portfolios – In the Home, On the Road, and At Play. The findings indicate that while there are a variety of resources in place to support those who work closely with families to prevent injuries among children, many service providers and families continue to face several challenges. The desire to remain connected through conversation and to receive support through resource sharing from CSL remains high.



Congratulations to CSL's Chantal Walsh's who completed the *National Newcomer Navigation Network Program*. In response to the Syrian refugee influx in 2015, the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario launched a project that focuses on breaking down barriers faced by newcomers. The IWK had three successful applicants in this inaugural program, out of only 30 people across Canada.





Katherine is a new Safety Coach at IWK Health and was highlighted with other Safety Coaches in the fall issue of "Your IWK". Safety Coaches take a leadership role in enhancing the quality and safety of care provided to patients and families with their local teams.
